
HONORING SERVICE...

ROCKWALL CERT SEEKING HEATH MEMBERS

The Rockwall Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), which serves the entire Rockwall County area, is seeking Heath residents. If you have ever wanted to be of service during a disaster such as the Rowlett/Garland tornados in 2015, this is your opportunity. The next two-day Basic Training Class will be held on September 23 and 30 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The curriculum includes indoor and outdoor training on disaster preparedness, fire safety, controlling utilities, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, introduction to the incident command system, disaster psychology, and terrorism response. A Public Hearing to receive citizen input regarding the proposed budget will be held at the September 12th City Council Meeting. NEW ARCHITECTURAL STANDARDS ADVISORY COMMITTEE APPOINTED

The Heath City Council has appointed a new Architectural Standards Advisory Committee to review the City's current architectural design standards. The committee will make recommendations for an architectural theme and architectural tools to be consistently applied. Skill sets and occupations sought for this committee included civil engineers, architects, builders, developers and local business owners. CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

FM 740

The TXDOT contractor is working to complete all four lanes between Smirl (City Hall) and the FM-740/ FM-550 intersection (Shell) shortly after the first day of school. It is anticipated that four lanes will be open along the entire length of the project from Smirl to Heath Crossing (CVS) by the end of December, although TXDOT will continue to install sidewalks and grass and perform clean-up after December.

Signal lights should also be installed and operational by the end of December. The traffic signals will be located at the following intersections: Hawk Drive and FM-740; FM-740 and Smirl; and FM-740 and FM-550.

RABBIT RIDGE-HORIZON ROAD PROJECT

Construction has begun on two lanes of the concrete roadway along Rabbit Ridge from Dennis Bailey to Horizon Road; and along Horizon Road, from Old Vineyard to Rabbit Ridge. It is estimated that it will take seven months to complete the project.

PROJECTS NOW UNDERWAY

- Rabbit Ridge Phase 2 (Ridge Lakes subdivision to FM-550 Includes 12" water Line) - Obtaining right-of-way; plans 85% complete.
- Myers/Crisp Roadway Improvements The project is waiting on the relocation of existing private utilities along Crisp Lane, upon which the City will bid the project. Construction time is estimated to be 7 to 9 months.
- Rabbit Ridge and Horizon Rd. Extension (Adjacent to Cobblestone Subdivision) - The project began in July and is scheduled to take 7 months
- Hubbard Drive Roadway Improvements (reconstruction of sections of Hubbard Drive, including drainage improvements, FM-740 to south Scenic Drive) - Engineering has started. Additional right-of-way will be needed for the project.
- 3 Million Gallon Ground Storage Tank and Pump Station Expansion The project is under design. Construction is anticipated to start by November 2017 and be completed February 2019.
- McDonald Road Phase 2 Roadway Project (Phase 1 to City Limits: Falcon Point Subdivision) - Right-of-way is being obtained. New right-of-way will reduce the amount of one-lane roadway during construction. Two of the necessary right-of-way parcels have been acquired. Private utilities will have to be relocated before the project will be bid. Once started, construction time is estimated to be 6 to 7 months.



CURIOUS ABOUT THESE NEW SIGNS ON CHRIS CUNY BOULEVARD?

The Heath Municipal Benefits Corporation (HMBC) owns the 25 acres of land along Chris Cuny Boulevard and Hawk Drive. This land, branded as The Reserve, is adjacent to an additional 46 acres owned by the City. The MBC land is available for purchase or ground lease to business prospects that meet the City's vision for distinctive, high quality development that expands the City's sales and property tax base. Prospects enter an extensive review process with the Heath Economic Development Corporation and HMBC, which was established to help carefully guide the growth of the City's commercial base in line with citizen expectations. HEATH AND ROCKWALL WELCOME THE U.S. OPEN TRIATHLON AND 5K OCTOBER 15

Triathletes from all over the world will travel to Heath and Rockwall in October to race in the U.S. Open, the largest triathlon event in the D/FW area. They will swim 1500 meters in Lake Ray Hubbard, bike 24.8 miles and run 6.2 miles. A segment of the bike route will come through Heath.
