## CITY AND HEDC/HMBC LAUNCHES MASK CAMPAIGN: HEATH HEROES WEAR MASKS

As the global COVID-19 pandemic became local in March, the Heath City Council and Heath Economic Development Corporation (HEDC)/Heath Municipal Benefits Corporation (HMBC) moved swiftly to bring aid to Heath businesses with a stimulus program that tapped up to \$500,000 of the HMBC fund to provide monetary relief.

During Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the program, well over \$350,000 has already been provided in the form of forgivable loans to businesses within the City of Heath that are experiencing financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly restaurants, salons and health care providers.

Now, the focus is expanding to help get customers safely back to supporting Heath businesses with the *Heath Heroes Wear Masks* campaign. This is in addition to marketing support efforts that include the City's Business of the Day social media campaign and print advertising in the City's newsletter and local publications.

"This mask campaign is to get all Heath citizens to become Heroes by supporting our businesses' requirements of customers to wear masks so that all customers feel safe," said HEDC/HMBC President David Lane. "This is a requirement, but it's time for Heath citizens to take the lead and make sure everyone complies with this mandate and prop up our local businesses. We feel like this is an active way for all of us to be local Heroes in which we can provide support, and get the message going viral via our Heroes along with the City's communication and marketing resources."

In addition to providing *Heath Heroes Wear Masks* posters, the HEDC/ HMBC provided "high touch" businesses with a supply of Heath-branded masks to offer free-of-charge to customers who may need one. The masks

A PLAYGROUND FOCUSED ON INCLUSION

Despite pandemic challenges, many good works continue. That includes the tireless efforts by Heath residents, Ginny Jackson and Gini Seely, to bring an inclusive haven where children can play and caregivers can rest to Terry Park.

In August 2019, the Heath City Council dedicated a .54 acre parcel of land at the waterfront park for a beautiful all-abilities playground that will be privately funded. The playground has been designed by Robert Luna of Middleman Luna Architects, who designed Morgan's Wonderland, the all-abilities amusement park in San Antonio.

Luna's concept design is situated on a small footprint on the north end of Terry Park, but it packs in a ton of fun with play structures and features that are wheelchair accessible, sensory friendly and safe for all. The features also allow wounded war veterans to enjoy some of the attractions and take part in playing with their children.

Unique elements include musical instruments, a platform with more than 50 items such as

periscopes, and activities that answer every kid's love for climbing. Attractive shading and secure fencing that enhances the lakefront setting will surround the playground to ensure each child's safety and every caregiver's peace-of-mind.

Mr. Luna is now working on the construction documents so that the \$1.2 million project can move forward once the private donations have been raised.

"Due to COVID-19, we suspended all public fund-

raising events out of concern for the safety of our community and respect for the significant challenges so many individuals and families are facing right now," said Mrs. Jackson, noting that personal outreach to potential donors is ongoing.

When you support local businesses, your sales tax stays at work in Heath. That includes shopping, dining and receiving services at "brick and mortar" locations in town, as well as shopping online. Just be sure to input "Heath" as the city and your zip code when completing the billing and shipping information for online purchases.

### REPORT-A-CONCERN AT HEATHTX.COM

Just a reminder that you can report and track code violations online such as high grass and weeds, junk cars, parking violations, mosquito complaints, graffiti, trash and water violations. You will find the Report-A-Concern on the front page of the City website and under the Code Enforcement Department. You'll also find other ways to keep up with City activities on the website including the ability to listen to City Council meetings, view upcoming Planning & Zoning Commission notifications and related documents, and sign-up for Notify Me to receive City Council agendas when posted.

Waste Connections is asking Heath customers to remember to please place trash and recyclables in the correct polycarts: trash goes in the green; recycling goes in the blue. If trash co-mingles with recyclables in the blue polycart, the entire load has to go into the land fill instead of being recycled. Also, plastic bags such as grocery bags cannot be mixed with recyclables without ruining the load.
