# CONSERVING A PRECIOUS RESOURCE: WATER

Hot, dry summer weather has finally arrived, bringing an increase in demand upon our local water supply. Heath residents are encouraged to follow these guidelines below to achieve the most efficient and cost-effective use of this precious resource.

## **CURRENT WATERING RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Water your lawn and landscape up to twice per week between April 1 to October 31.
- Water your lawn and landscape once per week between November 1 to March 31.
- Avoid watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. from April 1 to October 31; it is most efficient to water between 6 p.m. and 10 a.m.

## **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: HUBBARD DRIVE**

The center line stripe recently painted on Hubbard Drive is for safety purposes. The stripe will help delineate the current asphalt roadway at night. The City will continue to monitor the Hubbard Drive roadway. The reconstruction of Hubbard has been funded and is under design.

The new roadway will be a widened two-lane concrete road including curb and gutter. The reconstruction will be constructed in two phases. Phase 1: FM-740 to Michael Drive, including the section of Hubbard adjacent to the Antigua Bay Subdivision, and Phase 2: Michael Drive to Scenic Place. Phase 1 construction is scheduled to begin in March 2022, with completion expected in 2023. Phase 2 construction is scheduled to begin soon after the start of Phase 1 construction.

# FOLLOW THE DESIGN HEATH TOWNE CENTER AND TOWNE CENTER PARK PROJECT



The City of Heath continues to work with the consulting firm of Kimley-Horn to develop a design for the Heath Towne Center, also known as the Towne Center Overlay District, and a design for Towne Center Park.

HMBC) with a stakeholder committee that includes HEDC/HMBC Board members, City Council liaisons, City staff, HTC property owners and HTC businesses.

# **HOW TO READ YOUR WATER METER**

#### **STEP 1: LOCATE YOUR METER**

Your water meter is generally located near the curb in front of your home and covered with a round green lid. Carefully remove the lid by using a tool called a water meter box lid key, which is available at home improvement stores.

#### **STEP 2: READ YOUR WATER METER**

All customers within the City of Heath have their water use measured by a meter. This results in each customer paying their share of operating the system based upon the amount of water used.

All City of Heath water meters measure water in gallons. Charges for the amount of water consumed are based on the number of gallons you use during a billing period.

To read a City water meter, simply read across the numbers in the box.



For example, if the dial has these numbers:

The current reading for the sample dial above is 1,234,560 gallons. Some meters have only six digits instead of seven, but they are read exactly the same way.

To determine how much water you have used over a period of time, get a first meter reading. Then after a determined amount of time (set by you, the customer), take a second meter reading. For example, if the reading you had taken earlier was 1234560 and the second reading was 1248900, you would have used 14,340 gallons, the difference in the two numbers in gallons, over that period of time.
