# CITY TESTS NEW EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION PROGRAM:

## HEATH SCAN — SAFE CITIZENS ALERT NETWORK

The City of Heath had the opportunity to put HEATH SCAN through a test run during the winter storm that moved in on February 2.

"Thankfully, we did not experience the extreme conditions the winter storms of 2021 brought, but we were prepared to quickly distribute emergency information specific to Heath citizens via SCAN without reliance upon third party sources if necessary," said City Manager Aretha Adams.

While the City urges residents to sign up for Rockwall County's free NIXLE alert system, HEATH SCAN is in place to provide an easy way to use your cell phone to access this information (just like a menu in a restaurant), which is critical when devices such as desktop computers are not available due to power outages.

Use your phone to scan the QR Code to go directly to the SCAN emergency page on the City's website that will be activated to provide real-time information as necessary. You can also access the page by typing heathtx.com/scan into your browser.

During non-emergency situations, citizens can go to the page for information on what to do before, during and after specific emergencies such as winter storms, power outages, extreme heat, severe weather and tornados.

#### **CARING FOR HEATH'S VULNERABLE**

If you have a loved one who is vulnerable during emergency situations, you can register them here for Wellness Checks by Heath Department of Public Safety officers. You may also purchase a lockbox for their door and provide the key to DPS officers to use during an emergency incident. Register on the SCAN page.

#### **UPDATING YOUR PREFERRED CONTACT INFORMATION:**

Before, during and after, the City of Heath also has the capability to send out alerts via text, phone or email. The contact information tied to your utility billing account will be used. If you would like to change the email or phone that is used, you can do so on the SCAN page.





# ANNUAL WATER SYSTEM MAINTENANCE PLANNED MARCH 1 — 29 TEMPORARY CHANGE IN WATER DISINFECTANT CRITICAL FOR SAFE DRINKING WATER YEAR ROUND

The North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) will temporarily change the disinfectant in its water treatment process from March 1 through March 29. The annual routine change is a common and safe practice necessary to maintain the right conditions inside pipelines and water quality year-round.

Disinfection is a critical part of the water treatment process that keeps drinking water free of harmful microorganisms, such as parasites and viruses. Disinfection involves a two-step process that first treats the water at the treatment plant and then chloramine disinfectant (chlorine + ammonia) is added to maintain water quality on its journey through the miles of pipes to homes and businesses.

NTMWD has conducted the temporary change in water disinfectant for over a decade and continues to meet safe drinking water standards earning recognition from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) as a Superior Public Water System.

The absence of ammonia during these few weeks may make the chlorine disinfectant more noticeable to some people. There are simple steps to minimize taste, odor or skin sensitivities, including placing a pitcher of water in the refrigerator overnight or adding a slice of citrus to

the water. Adding a crushed 1000 mg Vitamin C tablet to bath water will neutralize the chlorine.

#### TRAIL SYSTEM...

You can find a current trail system map at heathtx.com under the Living Here/Parks & Trails menu. This map identifies both existing and planned trails. New segments include the White Road Trail and trailhead that was donated and constructed by the developer of the Heath Crossing neighborhood. Trail segments have also been recently added in the Stoneleigh and Providence neighborhoods by their respective developers. These contributions are specified by the City parkland dedication ordinance, and the City is grateful for a shared commitment with developers to the "greater green"!

#### PARKLAND DONATIONS...

Others contributing to the parks and trail system include Heath residents, Tom Johnson and Dan Bobst, who donated .11 acres at 101 Hubbard Drive, which is a prime location along the Highlands of Heath and Hubbard trails. Both the Park Board and City Council dedicated the land use to be a future trailhead/park plaza that will tie into and complement the Towne Center Park and Towne Center Overlay District designs, both of which are still in progress. Thank you, Mr. Johnson and Mr. Bobst!

In 2021, the City exercised its option to purchase excess TxDOT right of way located along FM 740 in front of the Heath Towne Center/Tom Thumb retail site and dedicated the land for a "passive park" that will provide a beautiful greenspace and welcoming gateway into the heart of the community. The Park Board and City Council recently approved issuing a Request for Proposals for site designs that incorporate landscaping, seating, signage and more. The Heath Economic Development and Municipal Benefits Corporations funded the purchase through its sales tax revenue collected annually. This is one more example of your sales tax dollars at work in Heath...so keep shopping local intown and online!

# ADOPT-A-PARK/TRAIL LITTER CONTROL PROGRAM...

Now in its fourth year, this program offers civic-minded organizations and businesses an opportunity to help keep Heath's parks and trails attractive and safe by "adopting" a specific trail segment or park area. Participating volunteer groups are approved by the Park Board and City Council and will be responsible for a general cleanup of the adopted area quarterly.
