CITY RECEIVES FINANCIAL ACCOLADES FOLLOWING ANNUAL AUDIT

The City's financial statements for the 2021-2022 fiscal year once again received an unmodified opinion from independent auditors, which is the best of the four types of opinions that the City could have received.

Brooks Watson & Co., PLLC Certified Public Accountants conducted the audit and praised the City of Heath Council and Finance Department for its best practices in consistently maintaining conservative fiscal management, policies and procedures that have resulted in a balanced budget and healthy reserve fund balance.

CITY OF HEATH DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN AND ORDINANCE MODIFIED

City Council approved amendments to the City of Heath Water Resource and Emergency Management Plan (Drought Contingency) Plan suggested by City staff at its May 9 City Council meeting.

The modifications include additional triggers to avoid the rapid escalation of water restrictions citizens endured in 2022. These triggers are tied to monitoring daily usage and enacting restrictions as necessary on a more gradual schedule.

WHY DID THE CITY OF HEATH MODIFY THE PLAN?

Last year, the City of Heath's previous water supply contract with the City of Rockwall allowed up to 5.5 million gallons of water use per day. But as the hot, dry summer simmered on, Heath customer demand spiked drastically to over 7 million gallons per day.

At the same time, NTMWD was struggling to meet Rockwall's overall demand. Rockwall is a NTMWD member city, Heath is a customer of Rockwall. Rockwall directed Heath to immediately reduce water use, thus the rapid acceleration of water restrictions for Heath customers from Stage 1 to Stage 3 in three days.

The consequences of the City of Heath's water storage facilities running too low would have been dire, including mandatory boil notices that in turn require the closure of schools, day care facilities, restaurants and the grocery store due to the lack of a safe water supply.

In the coming dry and hot months, the City of Heath will be limited to a daily water usage of 6 million gallons.

"These changes provide additional tools in our water conservation toolbox to protect our customers," said Matthew Holzapfel, P.E., Director of Public Works.

TRIGGERS ENACTING WATER RESTRICTIONS

STAGE 1:

City water usage exceeds 75% of the daily water supply limit for two days in a seven-day period. (The City is currently in Stage 1, which limits landscape watering with an irrigation system to once per week.)

STAGE 2:

City water usage exceeds 90% of the daily water supply limit for two days in a seven-day period.

STAGE 3:

City water usage exceeds 95% of the daily water supply limit for two days in a seven-day period, or any set of conditions where it appears that the City water demand will exceed the ability of City water system or water supply.

Please monitor the City's website and Facebook and Twitter for restriction updates. Notices of any changes will also be sent via the City's utility billing notification system. Additionally, you will find resources on how to conserve water at your home, including xeriscape landscaping techniques and irrigation guides for your lawn.
